General Areas of Service:

With a Bachelor of Science degree in Aviation Management, you will be equipped with the knowledge and management skills necessary to stay current with the fast-paced and ever-changing aerospace and aviation industry. This degree will provide the industry knowledge needed, along with a strong background in management skills and business knowledge. In addition, this degree emphasizes good communication skills, global awareness, organizational behavior, and critical thinking. It also focuses on FAA regulations and requirements to become a well-rounded aviation management professional.

Professional Training:

Educational requirements for aviation industry managers vary widely, ranging from a high school diploma to a master's degree, depending on the size and complexity of the organization. Whatever the manager's educational background, it must be accompanied by related work experience reflecting demonstrated ability. Experience is essential for advancement.

Job Outlook:

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, "employment of administrative services and facilities managers is projected to grow 5 percent from 2022 to 2032, faster than the average for all occupations. About 31,400 openings for administrative services and facilities managers are projected each year, on average, over the decade." (See www.bls.gov).

Earnings:

Salaries vary widely depending on the career path chosen within the field of aviation management. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, "the median annual pay for administrative services managers was \$106,470 in May 2023." (See www.bls.gov)
