Academic Information

Admission

Main Campus

Individuals seeking admission to the Walla Walla College Summer Session must give evidence of necessary educational background for success in the courses desired and must apply for admission on forms supplied by the Office of Enrollment or online. An application form is enclosed at the back of this publication. New students wishing regular admission as undergraduate students must supply the Office of Enrollment with complete official transcripts from high school showing a date of graduation and cumulative grade point average (or satisfactory GED results). New students must also supply the Office of Enrollment with official transcripts of all previous collegiate/university-level work completed, a \$40 application fee, and character reference if requested. A physical examination, tuberculosis skin test, and proof of immunization will also be required.

Undergraduate students must meet the requirements for admission to the freshman class or advanced standing as outlined in the online College Bulletin. Graduate students must meet admission requirements as outlined in the Graduate School Bulletin. North Pacific Union Conference K-12 teachers should apply through their conference educational superintendent.

Mature individuals who apply through the Office of Enrollment but who are ineligible for regular admission or are not working on a degree may register for any course for which they have sufficient background (non-matriculating). Such students are not eligible for a degree; however, by completing requirements for regular admission they may become degree candidates.

Marine Station - Rosario Beach

Students planning to enroll at the Marine Station should submit a Marine Station application and fee. See page 12.

Registration

Continuing/returning students may register for classes beginning April 23, either online through OASIS or in person at the Academic Records Office. New students, including Smart Start participants, will be given an opportunity to register at academy campuses or by phone (800-558-2132) after April 23. Financial clearance is also required and may be arranged at Student Financial Services after June 5 (see page 7). Online students may register according to the instructions at you.wwc.edu (see page 10).

North Pacific Union Conference K-12 teachers who have obtained approval for conference sponsorship may register online or by mail after April 23. Early registration is encouraged.

Any students, including K-12 teachers, who have not completed registration in advance may register during regular office hours on the first day of classes. Registration is not official until all procedures have been completed and financial clearance has been arranged. Students who register for classes but do not obtain financial clearance by the second day of their **first** summer course session will be automatically dropped from **all** summer courses (see page 6).

Marine Station - Rosario Beach

Registration will be held at the Marine Station on Tuesday, June 19, at 6:00 p.m. Students should arrive on campus June 19. Financial arrangements must be made prior to arrival at the station. See page 12.

Late Registration

Students who register after a class or workshop has begun will be charged a late registration fee of \$75. Students may not register for eight-week classes after the first week of the summer term. Students enrolling for short-term courses must be in attendance the first day of classes.

Course Load

The maximum number of credits for which an undergraduate student may enroll is six credits per four-week session unless an overload is approved by the associate vice president for academic administration. A course load of 9-12 credits is considered a full load for undergraduate students for the eight-week session. Course loads for graduate students vary according to the program of study.

Veterans Registration

Undergraduate students receiving veterans educational benefits need to register for a full course load of 9-12 credits. Questions regarding enrollment for summer school should be directed to the veterans adviser in the Academic Records Office.

Withdrawals

Students withdrawing from college or from individual courses must submit the appropriate official drop voucher to the Academic Records Office before the class is 75 percent over. During Summer Session, withdrawal deadlines vary according to the starting date and duration of each class; the table below lists main session withdrawal deadlines, as well as refund deadlines. A complete schedule of withdrawal deadlines for all sessions is available at the Academic Records Office or online at summer.wwc.edu/.

Students who register for classes but do not obtain financial clearance by the financial clearance deadline for their **first** summer course session will be automatically dropped from **all** summer courses (see page 5). The financial clearance deadline is the second day of each course session; see table below for main sessions.

When a student withdraws during the quarter, no refund will be made until 30 days after the close of the month in which the student withdrew. Students who leave school without completing withdrawal procedures will be charged until proper arrangements are made.

Financial Information

Tuition

Tuition for the summer quarter is \$516 per quarter hour. All students should plan to pay their tuition at the time of registration. Students who register for classes but do not obtain financial clearance by the second day of their **first** summer course session will be automatically dropped from **all** summer courses.

Fees are charged as published in the online 2006-07 Walla Walla College Financial Bulletin at www.wwc.edu/academics/bulletins/. Workshops or extended field trips may require payment of special fees. See page 12 for Rosario Marine Station charges. Students applying to the Portland Campus Nursing program should contact the School of Nursing for financial information.

Tuition – North Pacific Union Conference Teachers

Teachers from within the North Pacific Union Conference of Seventh-day Adventists who are sponsored by their respective employing organizations may present verification of sponsorship in lieu of tuition payment. However, **teachers are expected to pay for books and supplies, graduation fees, any miscellaneous class fees, and room rental charges**. Conference sponsorship does not cover classes requiring individualized instruction (aviation, music lessons, etc).

Tuition Refunds

A student withdrawing from classes during the summer quarter will receive a refund in accordance with the policy in the online Financial Bulletin. A 100 percent refund is given if no more than 10 percent of the class is over, 75 percent if no more than 20 percent of the class is over, and 50 percent if no more than 40 percent of the class is over. Refund deadlines vary according to the length and dates of the class; see page 6 for main session refund dates. A complete schedule of refund dates for all sessions is available at the Academic Records Office or online at summer.wwc.edu/.

When a student withdraws during the quarter, no refund will be made until 30 days after the close of the month in which the student withdrew. Students who leave school without completing withdrawal procedures will be charged until proper arrangements are made.

Cafeteria

Vegetarian meals are available at the main campus in the Student Association Center (SAC) in Kellogg Hall from 12:00–1:00 and 5:00–6:00 weekdays, or as announced. Food items may also be charged at The Express, a college-operated mini-mart. Students should plan approximately \$55-60 per week for food.

Music Fees

Music lessons can be taken for credit or no credit. When lessons are taken for credit, in addition to the regular tuition charge there is a lesson fee of \$225 per quarter for nine half-hour lessons or \$450 per quarter for nine one-hour lessons. When lessons are not taken for credit, the lesson fee is \$261 per quarter for nine half-hour lessons or \$522 per quarter for nine one-hour lessons. Full-time music majors and minors who have taken MUCT 121-123 are not charged the lesson fee. Smart Start students who include music lessons in their 12-hour load are charged the lesson fee unless they are music majors or minors.

Insurance

All registered, tuition-paying graduate and undergraduate students attending the College Place, Montana, Portland, or Rosario campuses, and students in the summer work program, are covered by the Student Accident Insurance policy.

If a student has been enrolled in the mandatory student sickness and additional accident insurance during the regular 2006-07 school year, that coverage is in effect through September 1, 2007. All new undergraduate students will be enrolled in this coverage for the summer at a cost of \$305 unless they submit a waiver form verifying comparable coverage to Campus Health Services at registration time.

Employment (On-campus Student Work Program)

Although Walla Walla College strives to meet each student's needs, work opportunities are limited during the summer months. Students are strongly urged to make arrangements for work **before** arriving on campus because employment is not guaranteed. Permission to begin working is given only to students who are registered for summer quarter or who have been accepted for fall quarter. Employment opportunities are available in housekeeping, plant maintenance, The Express, library, campus offices, and academic departments.

Regulations require that all employees hired present **original** documents that establish both their identity and eligibility to work. All students wishing to work on the Walla Walla College campus will be required to present documents **before** they will be authorized to begin work. Walla Walla College offers a **SUMMER BONUS** for students who are employed by Walla Walla College, Varsity Contractors, Inc., or Sodexo Food Service. Students who work a minimum of 460 hours at any of these locations during the summer of 2007 **and** who register for at least 12 hours of classes fall quarter 2007 will receive a refund of all dormitory room rent charged for the summer, excluding single room charges, **or** a refund of college housing rent charged for the summer, not to exceed the cost of living in the dormitory. Students participating in this program will be required to sign a Summer Bonus Agreement that authorizes 40 percent of their earnings to be transferred directly to their student account to cover summer room, cafeteria, tuition, and other charges as they occur. If charges exceed 40 percent of their earnings, students are responsible for paying their account promptly when billed.

Financial Aid

Students who need assistance for summer quarter may apply for financial aid. Some Walla Walla College grant dollars may be available; some students may also be eligible for a Federal Pell Grant. Loans may be available, such as Federal Stafford loans and institutional loans through Walla Walla College.

Students who wish to be considered for federal grants and loans will want to mail their 2006-07 FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) by **April 15, 2007**. The FAFSA must be received by the federal processor by June 30, 2007. **The federal government will not grant exceptions to this deadline.** A student cannot be considered for the Federal Pell Grant, SEOG grant, Perkins Loan, Nursing Loan, or Stafford Loan if this deadline is missed.

A completed Financial Aid file contains:

1. Correct SAR (Student Aid Report). The SAR is generated by the federal processor after a FAFSA is submitted. Students who list Walla Walla College (code 003799) on their FAFSA will have their SAR electronically sent to Walla Walla College by the federal processor. Students who did not list Walla Walla College on their FAFSA will need to contact Student Financial Services.
2. Walla Walla College Financial Aid Application (FAA). The student should mail this directly to Student Financial Services at Walla Walla College.
3. Proof of high school completion (final transcript or letter of verification).
4. Additional documentation, if needed, for verification purposes.

Only financial aid that has been awarded by registration time may be deducted from the estimated costs. Students eligible for Federal or Washington State financial aid must be **registered for classes by June 30**. Students who register or add classes after that date cannot receive Federal or State financial aid for those classes.

Students who are on a waiting list or waiting for a letter of acceptance should complete the financial aid application. Awarding of financial aid does not constitute acceptance into Walla Walla College. However, if a student moves off the waiting list at the last moment, it is to the student's advantage to have the financial aid application already completed.

2007 Smart Start Program

Smart Start is available to any undergraduate student on the College Place campus who has never before taken a class at Walla Walla College (except as a high school or academy student). A student in this program receives a discounted summer tuition rate. In addition, a full-time Smart Start student who also enrolls full time fall quarter will receive a cash rebate of \$500. (The rebate is awarded upon verification of enrollment after the tenth day of fall quarter. The amount of the rebate is prorated for students who complete fewer than 12 summer credits.) Here's what a Smart Start student saves:

Additional Costs

- Deposit (\$25) by May 31
- Dormitory rent (\$79-83 per week; Smart Start students are expected to live in the dormitory if their permanent address is outside the Walla Walla Valley.)
- Meals (approximately \$55-60 per week)
- Textbooks (approximately \$250)
- Health insurance (\$305; waived if proof of other coverage is provided to Campus Health Services)
- Miscellaneous expenses (A few courses have additional fees.)

Smart Start students who take GenOnline courses (see page 10) will pay the GenOnline tuition rate for those courses. GenOnline courses may count on the summer load for purposes of the Smart Start rebate.

All tuition is due at registration. Other charges are due when billed. Visa, MasterCard, and Discover are accepted. Some job opportunities are available on campus for students who wish to work (see page 8). A reasonable work load for a summer student taking a full academic load is 8-10 hours per week.

Application Process

Students interested in the Smart Start program should follow the usual application procedure for admission to Walla Walla College and indicate their interest in the summer smart start program on the application. (See page 5 for admission information and page 27 for an application form.) After having been accepted to the college, a student may reserve a place in the Smart Start program with a \$25 non-refundable deposit to the Summer Session Office. The reservation and deposit should be mailed or submitted online by May 31, as enrollment is limited. The Summer Session Office will notify the student regarding acceptance into the program.

Smart Start Checklist

In summary, a Smart Start student must:

- ✓ Have earned zero college credit at Walla Walla College (except as a full-time academy or high school student).
- ✓ Meet the Walla Walla College admission requirements and be admitted to the college as a regular student on the College Place campus.
- ✓ Reserve a place in Smart Start with a \$25 non-refundable deposit.
- ✓ Pay the tuition balance at registration, plus other charges when billed.
- ✓ Live in the dormitory, if the student's permanent address is outside the Walla Walla Valley.

Online Education

Students taking online courses must have basic computer competency, including use of e-mail and regular Internet access. Information on minimum computer hardware requirements is available at the "Equipment" link on the distance learning website: you.wwc.edu.

Online courses begin on June 18 and end on August 10 unless otherwise indicated. Enrollment minimums and maximums apply.

GenOnline Courses

GenOnline during summer 2007 provides general studies courses in an online format. A special discounted tuition rate of \$300 per credit hour applies to this program. The discounted rate applies only to the courses that are specifically designated as GenOnline and identified in the class schedule by the letter **G**. Students enrolled in the Smart Start program (see page 9) who take GenOnline courses will pay the GenOnline tuition rate for these courses. GenOnline tuition represents a savings of \$216 per credit hour.

Students should consult their advisers to determine which courses will satisfy their needed requirements. While all of the following courses are applicable to general studies requirements, the usual minimums and maximums in each area must also be considered. The following courses are offered:

Acceptance

Students planning to enroll at the Marine Station should submit a Marine Station application and fee. Limited facilities at the Marine Station necessitate restricted enrollments in most classes; consequently, application does not guarantee acceptance. Early submission of application forms and deposit will increase the probability of acceptance. Application forms may be obtained from the director of the Marine Station, c/o Department of Biological Sciences, Walla Walla College, 204 South College Avenue, College Place, WA 99324; (509) 527-2602; rosario@wwc.edu; or online at rosario.wwc.edu.

Tuition

The tuition is \$516 per quarter hour. Students registered for one or two upper-division (400+) courses are charged for 10 quarter hours plus a lab fee of \$1032. Affiliate students pay tuition and lab fees directly to the school in which they are enrolled.

Meals and Housing

All residents of single-student accommodations are charged a flat rate of \$687 for meals for the summer session. Housing charges are as follows:

Application Fee

In order to reserve enrollment and housing, a \$40 nonrefundable fee is required and due at the time of application.

Insurance

All Rosario students must provide proof of health insurance coverage. Registered, tuition-paying Walla Walla College students are covered by a Student Accident Insurance policy.

Registration and Textbooks

Registration for classes will be held at the Marine Station on Tuesday, June 19, at 6:00 p.m. Students should arrive on campus June 19. Financial arrangements must be made prior to arrival. Books will be available for purchase at the station. Estimated textbook costs are \$200.

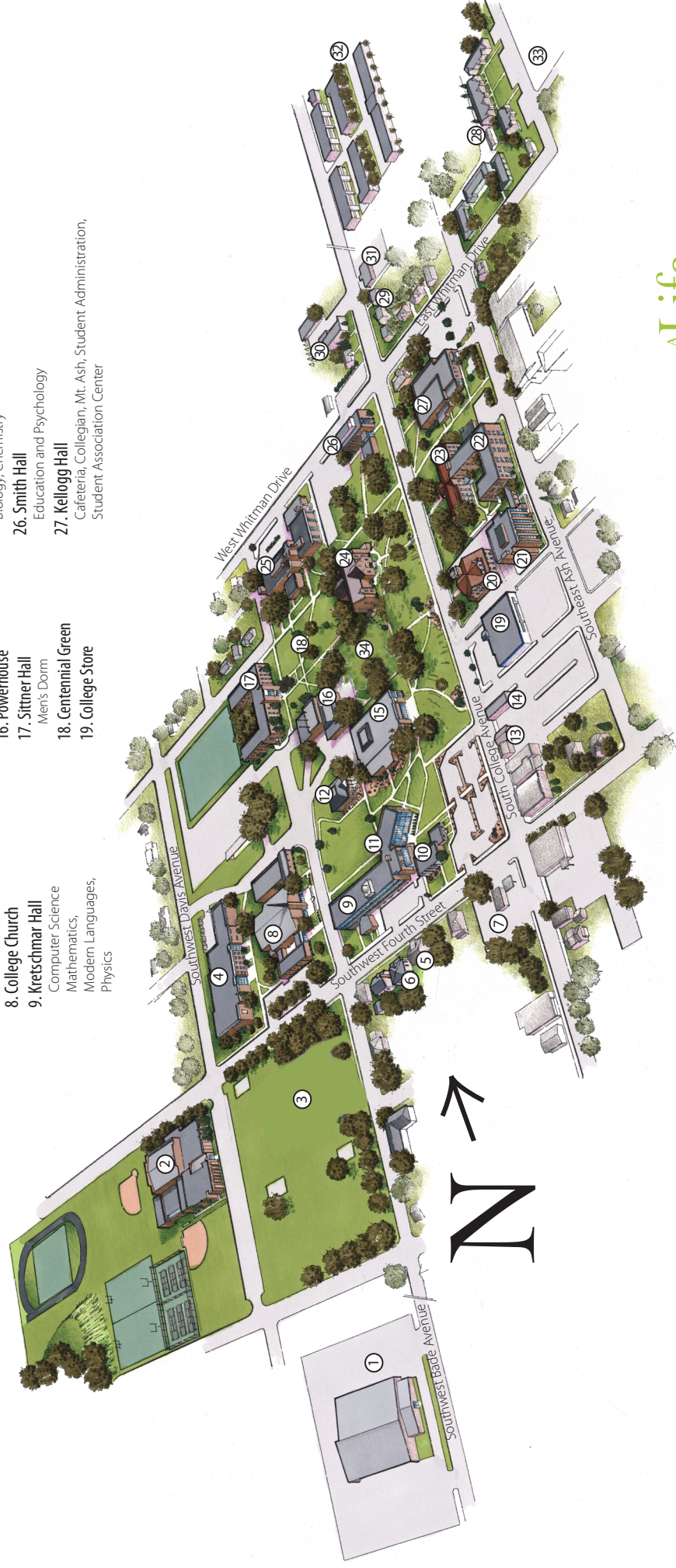
