# Academic Information

## Admission

Individuals seeking admission to the Walla Walla University Summer Session must give evidence of necessary educational background for success in the courses desired and must apply for admission online or on forms supplied by the Office of Marketing and Enrollment Services. New students wishing regular admission as undergraduate students must supply the Office of Marketing and Enrollment Services with complete official transcripts from high school showing a date of graduation and cumulative grade point average (or satisfactory GED results). New students must also supply official transcripts of all previous collegiate/university-level work completed, a \$40 application fee, and character reference if requested. A physical examination, tuberculosis skin test, and proof of immunization will also be required.

Undergraduate students must meet the requirements for admission to the freshman class or advanced standing as outlined in the online University Bulletin. Graduate students must meet admission requirements as outlined in the Graduate School Bulletin. North Pacific Union Conference K-12 teachers should apply through their conference educational superintendent.

Individuals who are ineligible for regular admission or are not working on a degree may register for any course for which they have sufficient background (non-matriculating). Such students are not eligible for a degree; however, by completing requirements for regular admission they may become degree candidates.

## Registration

Continuing/returning students may register for classes beginning April 19, either online through OASIS or in person at the Academic Records Office. New students, including Smart Start participants, will be given an opportunity to register at academy campuses or by phone (800-558-2132) after April 19. Financial clearance is also required and may be arranged at Student Financial Services after June 7 (see page 8). Online students may register according to the instructions at [wallawalla.edu/academics/distance-learning-d2l](http://wallawalla.edu/academics/distance-learning-d2l) (see page 10).

North Pacific Union Conference K-12 teachers who qualify for conference sponsorship may register online at [summer.wallawalla.edu/k-12](http://summer.wallawalla.edu/k-12) after April 19. Conference authorization will be verified before the registration is processed. Early registration is encouraged.

Any students, including K-12 teachers, who have not completed registration in advance may register during regular office hours on the first day of classes. Registration is not official until all procedures have been completed and financial clearance has been arranged. Students who register for classes but do not obtain financial clearance by the second day of their **first** summer course session will be automatically dropped from **all** summer courses (see page 7).

## Rosario Beach Marine Laboratory Registration

Students planning to enroll at Rosario Beach Marine Laboratory must submit a Rosario application and fee. Registration will be held at Rosario on Tuesday, June 22, at 6:00 p.m. Students should arrive on campus June 22. Financial and housing arrangements must be made prior to arrival. See page 14.

## Veterans Registration

Undergraduate students receiving veterans educational benefits need to register for a full course load of 9-12 credits. Questions regarding enrollment for summer school should be directed to the veterans adviser in the Academic Records Office.

## Late Registration

Students who register after a class or workshop has begun will be charged a late registration fee of \$75. Students may not register for eight-week classes after the first week of the summer term. Students taking short-term courses must be registered and in attendance the first day of classes.

## Course Load

The maximum number of credits for which an undergraduate student may enroll is six credits per four-week session unless an overload is approved by the associate vice president for academic administration. A course load of 9-12 credits is considered a full load for undergraduate students for the eight-week session. Course loads for graduate students vary according to the program of study.

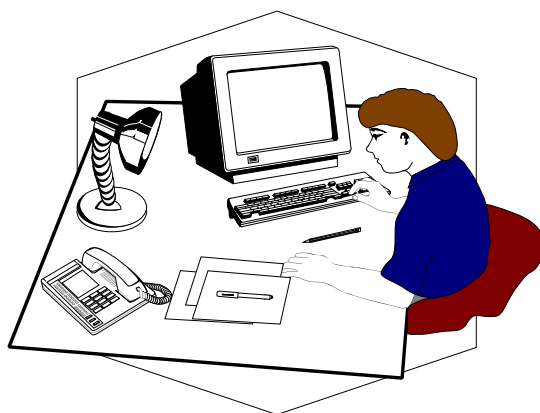
## Withdrawals

Students withdrawing from any or all courses must submit the appropriate official drop voucher to the Academic Records Office before the class(es) are 75 percent over. During Summer Session, withdrawal deadlines vary according to the starting date and duration of each class; the table below lists main session withdrawal deadlines, as well as refund deadlines. A complete schedule of withdrawal deadlines for all sessions is available at the Academic Records Office.

Students who register for classes but do not obtain financial clearance by the financial clearance deadline for their **first** summer course session will be automatically dropped from **all** summer courses (see page 6). The financial clearance deadline is the second day of each course session; see table below for main sessions.

When a student withdraws during the quarter, no refund will be made until 30 days after the close of the month in which the student withdrew. Students who leave school without completing withdrawal procedures will be charged until proper arrangements are made. Refunds, if applicable, will be based on the date these arrangements are completed, not the date course attendance ended.

# Financial Information

## Tuition

Undergraduate tuition for the summer quarter is \$590 per quarter hour; graduate tuition is \$511 per quarter hour. All students should plan to pay their tuition at the time of registration. Students who register for classes but do not obtain financial clearance by the second day of their **first** summer course session will be automatically dropped from **all** summer courses.

Fees are charged as published in the online 2009-10 Walla Walla University Financial Bulletin at [wallawalla.edu/academics/bulletins](http://wallawalla.edu/academics/bulletins). Workshops or extended field trips may require payment of special fees. See page 14 for Rosario Beach Marine Laboratory charges. Students applying to the Portland Campus Nursing program should contact the School of Nursing for financial information.

## Tuition – North Pacific Union Conference Teachers

Teachers from within the North Pacific Union Conference of Seventh-day Adventists who are sponsored by their respective employing organizations may present verification of sponsorship in lieu of tuition payment. However, **teachers must pay directly when billed for books and supplies, graduation fees, any miscellaneous class fees, and room rental charges.** Conference sponsorship does not cover classes requiring individualized instruction (aviation, music lessons, etc).

## Tuition Refunds

A student withdrawing from classes during the summer quarter will receive a refund in accordance with the policy in the online Financial Bulletin. A 100 percent refund is given if no more than 10 percent of the class is over, 75 percent if no more than 20 percent of the class is over, and 50 percent if no more than 40 percent of the class is over. Refund deadlines vary according to the length and dates of the class; see page 7 for main session refund dates. A complete schedule of refund dates for all sessions is available at the Academic Records Office.

When a student withdraws during the quarter, no refund will be made until 30 days after the close of the month in which the student withdrew. Students who leave school without completing withdrawal procedures will be charged until proper arrangements are made. Refunds, if applicable, will be based on the date these arrangements are completed, not the date course attendance ended.

## Housing

Single students are expected to live in the dormitory unless an exception is approved by the Office of Student Life. Dormitory rates are as follows:

Foreman Hall (women)—\$92 per week double occupancy; \$117 per week single occupancy

Sittner Hall (men)—\$88 per week double occupancy; \$114 per week single occupancy

Hansen Hall (Portland campus)—\$118 per week

## Cafeteria

Vegetarian meals are available at the main campus dining room in Kellogg Hall from 11:30–1:15 weekdays, or as announced. Students may purchase noon meals for a flat rate of \$6.99 per meal. All cafeteria purchases by enrolled students, dormitory residents, or summer campus workers may be charged on student accounts. Enrolled students may also charge meals and food items at The Express, a university-operated mini-mart.

## Music Fees

Music lessons can be taken for credit or no credit. When lessons are taken for credit, in addition to the regular tuition charge there is a lesson fee of \$240 per quarter for nine half-hour lessons or \$480 per quarter for nine one-hour lessons. When lessons are not taken for credit, the lesson fee is \$276 per quarter for nine half-hour lessons or \$552 per quarter for nine one-hour lessons. Full-time music majors and minors who have taken MUCT 121-123 are not charged the lesson fee. Smart Start students who include music lessons in their 12-hour load are charged the lesson fee unless they are music majors or minors.

## Insurance

All registered, tuition-paying graduate and undergraduate students attending the College Place, Montana, Portland, or Rosario campuses, and students in the summer work program, are covered by the Student Accident Insurance policy.

If a student has been enrolled in the mandatory student sickness and additional accident insurance during the regular 2009-10 school year, that coverage is in effect through September 1, 2010. All new undergraduate students will be enrolled in this coverage for the summer at a cost of \$319 unless they submit a waiver form verifying comparable coverage to Campus Health and Wellness at registration time.

## On-campus Student Employment

Although Walla Walla University strives to meet each student's needs, work opportunities are limited during the summer months. Students are strongly urged to make arrangements for work **before** arriving on campus because employment is not guaranteed. Employment opportunities may be available in grounds, custodial, dorm housekeeping, plant maintenance, The Express, library, campus offices, and academic departments. Permission to begin working is given only to students who are registered for summer quarter or who have been accepted for fall quarter.

Regulations require that all employees hired present **original** documents that establish both their identity and eligibility to work. All students wishing to work on the Walla Walla University campus are required to present documents **before** they will be authorized to begin work. Walla Walla University offers a Summer Bonus for students who are employed by Walla Walla University. Students who work a minimum of 460 hours during the summer of 2010 **and** who are registered for at least 12 credits of coursework at the end of the tenth day of fall quarter 2010 will receive a refund of 50 percent of all dormitory room rent charged for the summer, excluding single room charges, **or** a refund of 50 percent of university housing rent charged for the summer, not to exceed the cost of living in the dormitory.

All students who reside and work on campus during the summer are required to sign either a Summer Worker Agreement or a Summer Bonus Agreement by July 1, 2010, authorizing 40 percent of their earnings to be transferred directly to their student account to cover summer dormitory or university housing rent, cafeteria, tuition, and other charges as they occur. If charges exceed 40 percent of their earnings, students are responsible for paying their account promptly when billed.

## Financial Aid

Students who need assistance for summer quarter may apply for financial aid. Some Walla Walla University grant dollars may be available; some students may also be eligible for a Federal Pell Grant. Loans may be available, such as Federal Stafford loans and institutional loans through Walla Walla University.

Students who wish to be considered for federal grants and loans will want to submit their 2009-10 FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) online at [fafsa.ed.gov](http://fafsa.ed.gov) by **April 15, 2010**. The FAFSA must be received by the federal processor by June 30, 2010. **The federal government will not grant exceptions to this deadline.** A student cannot be considered for the Federal Pell Grant, SEOG grant, Perkins Loan, Nursing Loan, or Stafford Loan if this deadline is missed.

A completed Financial Aid file contains:

1. Correct SAR (Student Aid Report). The SAR is generated by the federal processor after a FAFSA is submitted. Students who list Walla Walla University (code 003799) on their FAFSA will have their SAR electronically sent to Walla Walla University by the federal processor. Students who did not list Walla Walla University on their FAFSA will need to contact Student Financial Services.
2. Walla Walla University Financial Aid Application (FAA). This application may be submitted online at [sfs.wallawalla.edu/application](http://sfs.wallawalla.edu/application).
3. Proof of high school completion (final transcript or letter of verification).
4. Additional documentation, if needed, for verification purposes.

Only financial aid that has been awarded by registration time may be deducted from the estimated costs. Students eligible for Federal or Washington State financial aid must be **registered for classes by June 30**. Students who register or add classes after that date cannot receive Federal or State financial aid for those classes.

Students who are on a waiting list or waiting for a letter of acceptance should complete the financial aid application. Awarding of financial aid does not constitute acceptance into Walla Walla University. However, if a student moves off the waiting list at the last moment, it is to the student's advantage to have the financial aid application already completed.

# Online & Hybrid Courses

Students taking online or hybrid courses must have basic computer competency, including use of e-mail and regular Internet access. Information on minimum computer hardware requirements is available at the "Equipment" link on the distance learning website: [wallawalla.edu/academics/distance-learning-d2l](http://wallawalla.edu/academics/distance-learning-d2l).

The regular tuition rate applies for all online and hybrid courses (see page 8). Smart Start students pay the Smart Start rate for online courses (see page 12). Online courses begin on June 21 and end on August 13 unless otherwise indicated. Enrollment minimums and maximums apply.

- Guest students taking courses for transfer to other institutions (not seeking a degree at Walla Walla University) register by completing a registration form and credit card information online at [wallawalla.edu/academics/distance-learning-d2l](http://wallawalla.edu/academics/distance-learning-d2l).

# Smart Start Program

Smart Start is open to any undergraduate student who has never before taken a class at Walla Walla University (except as a high school or academy student). A Smart Start student may take courses online and/or on the College Place campus. A student in this program receives a discounted summer tuition rate. In addition, a full-time Smart Start student who also enrolls for a full load fall quarter will receive a rebate of \$500. The rebate is credited to the student's account upon verification of enrollment after the tenth day of fall quarter. (The amount of the rebate is prorated for students who completed fewer than 12 summer credits.) Here's what a Smart Start student saves:

## Additional Costs

- Dormitory rent: Smart Start students taking courses on the College Place campus must live in the dormitory if their permanent address is outside the Walla Walla Valley (\$88–\$92 per week)
- Meals: weekday noon meals are available at the cafeteria; students may also charge meals or food items at The Express (see page 8) (approximately \$60–\$75 per week)
- Textbooks (approximately \$300–\$350)
- Health insurance; waived if proof of other coverage is provided to Campus Health & Wellness (\$319)
- Miscellaneous expenses (A few courses have additional fees; see page 8.)

All tuition, fees, and housing costs are due at registration. Other charges are due when billed. Visa, MasterCard, and Discover are accepted. Some job opportunities are available on campus for students who wish to work (see page 9). For a summer student taking a full academic load, a reasonable work load is 8–10 hours per week.

## Application Process

Students interested in the Smart Start program should follow the usual application procedure for admission to Walla Walla University and indicate their interest in the summer Smart Start program on the application. (See page 6 for admission information.) After being accepted to the university, a student may reserve a place in the Smart Start program with a \$50 deposit to the Summer Session Office. The reservation and deposit should be mailed or submitted online by June 4, as enrollment is limited. In the event of cancellation by June 4, the deposit is refundable. The Summer Session Office will notify the student regarding acceptance into the program.

## Smart Start Checklist

In summary, a Smart Start student must:

- ✓ Have earned zero college-level credit at Walla Walla University (except as a full-time academy or high school student)
- ✓ Meet the Walla Walla University admission requirements and be admitted to the university as a regular online or College Place student
- ✓ Reserve a place in Smart Start with a \$50 deposit by June 4
- ✓ Pay the tuition, class fees (if any), and housing costs at registration, plus other charges when billed
- ✓ Live in the dormitory while taking courses on the College Place campus, if the student's permanent address is outside the Walla Walla Valley

# Rosario Beach Marine Laboratory

## Acceptance

Students planning to enroll at Rosario Beach Marine Laboratory should submit a Rosario application and fee. Limited facilities at Rosario necessitate restricted enrollments in most classes; consequently, application does not guarantee acceptance. Early submission of application forms and deposit will increase the probability of acceptance. Application forms may be obtained online at [rosario.wallawalla.edu](http://rosario.wallawalla.edu).

## Tuition

Undergraduate tuition for the summer quarter is \$590 per quarter hour; graduate tuition is \$511 per quarter hour. Students registered for one or two upper-division (400+) courses are charged for 10 quarter hours plus a lab fee of \$400. Students registered for General Biology are charged for 12 quarter hours plus a lab fee of \$74. Affiliate students pay tuition and lab fees directly to the school in which they are enrolled.

## Meals and Housing

All residents of single-student accommodations are charged a flat rate of \$788 for meals for the summer session. Housing charges are as follows:

## Application Fee

In order to reserve enrollment and housing, a \$40 non-refundable fee is required and due at the time of application.

## Insurance

All Rosario students must provide proof of health insurance coverage. Registered, tuition-paying Walla Walla University students are covered by a Student Accident Insurance policy.

## Registration and Textbooks

Registration for classes will be held at Rosario on Tuesday, June 22, at 6:00 p.m. Students should arrive on campus June 22. Financial arrangements must be made prior to arrival. Books will be available for purchase at the station. Estimated textbook cost is approximately \$300-\$350.

# Course Descriptions

(The following course descriptions are for courses offered in the summer of 2010 but not listed in the 2009-10 online University Bulletin or Graduate Bulletin.)

## Business

### **ECON 400 TOPICS: ASIAN ECONOMICS 4**

Examines the economics of select Asian countries. Analyzes economic, social, political, and cultural factors that may contribute to the divergent levels of development, and includes a comparative study of a number of these Asian nations. Prerequisite: ECON 211 or permission of instructor. Offered as part of Hong Kong Study Tour.

### **MGMT 200/400 TOPICS: INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS, CONCEPTS, PRACTICES, & CULTURE 4**

Provides theoretical and practical introduction to business concepts which specifically compare Chinese and American cultures and business practices. A research paper will be required for upper division credit. Offered as part of Hong Kong Study Tour.

## Communications and Languages

### **COMM 400 TOPICS: SOCIAL MEDIA NETWORKING AND PRODUCTION 3**

Interdisciplinary theory and application of social media sites. Students deliver a variety of messages to social networks and digital distribution channels. Final projects will focus on the student's major discipline or related interest area and will be a comprehensive social media presence including photos, videos, and print. Prerequisite: a course in media, communications, graphics, or digital technology and competency recording digital video.

## Education and Psychology

### **EDUC 525 ADVANCED TECHNOLOGY TOOLS 2**

An advanced approach to technology in the classroom. This course includes the use of networks and the World Wide Web to communicate with students and parents, the development and application of multimedia for instructional purposes, and the understanding and use of varying technologies to optimize students' learning. Prerequisite: EDUC 515 or permission of instructor.

## English

### **ENGL 200 TOPICS: ENGLISH LITERATURE IN CONTEXT 4**

The study of English literature from the medieval period to the nineteenth century. Course material will emphasize the role of place and cultural context on the formation of literary works from Beowulf to the Romantic poets. May be substituted for either ENGL 210 or ENGL 211. Offered as part of UK10 English Literature and History Tour.

### **ENGL 400 TOPICS: ENGLISH GOTHIC AND ROMANTIC LITERATURE 4**

Explores the relationship between literature and culture of the late medieval period and the Romantic writers of the early nineteenth century. Readings include medieval drama and lyric poetry, the Canterbury Tales, Gothic fiction, and Romantic poetry. Will apply to the English major or minor. Offered as part of UK10 English Literature and History Tour.

## History and Philosophy

### **HIST 200 TOPICS: ENGLISH HISTORY IN CONTEXT 4**

This general studies course will survey English history from 1066 to 1688 within the broad historical themes of the history of Western Civilization. While based in London, Oxford, and York, students will visit a variety of urban and rural sites, including cathedrals, parish churches, castles, palaces, ancient pathways, and mysterious monuments. English and History majors may substitute this course for HIST 274 or HIST 121. Offered as part of UK10 English Literature and History Tour.

### **HIST 400 TOPICS: REFORMATION 4**

A historical study of the religious changes that took place in sixteenth century Europe. While the course will take place as part of the English and History study tour in England, the focus will be on the broader reformation. The course will examine the Lutheran Reformation, the Calvinist Reformation, the Anabaptist Reformation, the Catholic Reformation, and the English Reformation. England will provide the perfect laboratory for investigating these religious developments and conflicts from the time of Wycliffe through the English Civil War. Prerequisite: one course in history or permission of the instructor. Offered as part of UK10 English Literature and History Tour.

## Mathematics

### **MEDU 474 WORKSHOP: TECHNOLOGY IN THE MATHEMATICS CLASSROOM 1**

An introduction to the effective use of computer technology in the middle and high school mathematics classroom. This workshop explores how free-of-charge computer programs can support NAD and NCTM curriculum standards. Computer programs for graphing and visualization, analyzing data, exploring geometry, and other mathematical activities will be presented during morning sessions. Afternoon sessions will focus on developing lesson plans and projects based on these programs. Participants will leave with a CD containing the lesson plans and computer programs, ready to install and use with classroom PCs.

### **MEDU 490 PRACTICUM: TECHNOLOGY IN THE MATHEMATICS CLASSROOM 1**

Implementation of lesson plans developed during summer workshop MEDU 474, Technology in the Mathematics Classroom. Participants will utilize lesson plans in a real-world mathematics classroom, review their effectiveness, and when necessary revise the lesson plans. Results are to be submitted by the end of fall quarter 2010. Co-requisite: MEDU 474. Graded S or NC.

## Technology

### **PHTO 400 TOPICS: DIGITAL PHOTOGRAPHY FOR EDUCATORS 2**

Various practices of shooting quality photography with a digital camera. Digital camera selection and use, editing images for storing and retrieval, using images in different media, and doing digital manipulation. Application of the technique of "seeing" the image before capturing it. Making the proper adjustments for composition, lighting, and camera settings to achieve the desired results. (Course fee: \$55.)
