Academic Information

Admission

Individuals seeking admission to Walla Walla University must apply for admission either online at wallawalla.edu/apply or on forms supplied by the Marketing and Enrollment Services office. Prospective undergraduate students must meet admission requirements as outlined in the University's Undergraduate Bulletin. Prospective graduate students must meet admission requirements as outlined in the Graduate Bulletin. A "Steps to Enrollment Checklist" for either undergraduate or graduate students can be found at wallawalla.edu/apply.

North Pacific Union Conference K-12 teachers who are not seeking to obtain a graduate degree do not need to apply for admission. They should instead refer to the registration information in the following section.

Individuals who are not working on a degree may apply at the Academic Records Office to take any course for which they have sufficient background. As non-matriculating students, they are not eligible for a degree, although by completing requirements for regular admission they may become degree candidates.

Registration

Continuing/returning students may register for classes online through myWWU beginning April 22. New students, including Summer Advantage participants, will be given an opportunity to register at academy campuses or by phone (800-558-2132) after April 22. Distance learning students may register according to the instructions at wallawalla.edu/academics/distance-learning-d2l (see page 10).

North Pacific Union Conference K-12 teachers who qualify for conference sponsorship may register online at summer.wallawalla.edu/k-12 after April 22. Conference authorization will be verified before the registration is processed. Early registration is encouraged.

Any students, including K-12 teachers, who have not completed registration in advance may register at the Academic Records Office during regular office hours on the first day of classes. Registration is not official until all procedures have been completed and financial clearance has been arranged.

Financial Clearance

Online financial clearance is required and may be arranged through a student's myWWU account or through Student Financial Services after June 5 (see page 8). Students who register for classes but do not obtain financial clearance by June 24 will be automatically dropped from all summer courses.

Rosario Beach Marine Laboratory Registration

Students planning to enroll at Rosario Beach Marine Laboratory must submit an online Rosario application and fee. Registration will be held at Rosario on Tuesday, June 25, at 6:30 p.m. Students should arrive on campus June 25. Financial and housing arrangements must be made prior to arrival. See page 14.

Veterans Registration

Undergraduate students receiving veterans educational benefits need to register for a full course load of 9-12 credits. Questions regarding enrollment for summer school should be directed to the veterans adviser in the Academic Records Office.

Late Registration

Students who register after a class or workshop has begun will be charged a late registration fee of \$75. Students may not register for eight-week classes after the first week of the summer term. Students taking short-term courses must be registered and in attendance the first day of classes.

Course Load


The maximum course load for which an undergraduate student may enroll is 12 credits distributed evenly throughout the eight-week session, unless an overload is approved by the associate vice president for academic administration. A course load of 9-12 credits is considered a full load for undergraduate students for the eight-week session. Course loads for graduate students vary according to the program of study.

Withdrawals

Students withdrawing from any or all courses must submit the appropriate official withdrawal form to the Academic Records Office before the class(es) are 75 percent over. During Summer Session, withdrawal deadlines vary according to the starting date and duration of each class; the table below lists main session withdrawal deadlines, as well as refund deadlines. A complete schedule of withdrawal deadlines for all sessions is available at the Academic Records Office.

When a student withdraws during the quarter, no refund will be made until 30 days after the close of the month in which the student withdrew. Students who leave school without completing withdrawal procedures will be charged until proper arrangements are made. Refunds, if applicable, will be based on the date these arrangements are completed, not the date course attendance ended.

Financial Information

Tuition

Undergraduate tuition for the summer quarter is \$636 per quarter hour; graduate tuition is \$550 per quarter hour. All students should plan to pay their tuition at the time of registration. Students who register for classes but do not obtain financial clearance by **June 24**, the first day of summer quarter, will be automatically dropped from all summer courses.

Fees are charged as published in the online 2012-13 Walla Walla University Financial Bulletin at wallawalla.edu/academics/bulletins. Workshops or extended field trips may require payment of special fees. See page 14 for Rosario Beach Marine Laboratory charges. Students applying to the Portland Campus Nursing program should contact the School of Nursing for financial information.

Tuition – North Pacific Union Conference Teachers

Teachers from within the North Pacific Union Conference of Seventh-day Adventists who are sponsored by their respective employing organizations may present verification of sponsorship in lieu of tuition payment. However, **teachers must pay directly when billed for books and supplies, graduation fees, any miscellaneous class fees, and room rental charges**. Conference sponsorship does not cover classes requiring individualized instruction (aviation, music lessons, etc).

Tuition Refunds

A student withdrawing from classes during the summer quarter will receive a refund in accordance with the policy stated in the online Financial Bulletin. A 100 percent refund is given if no more than 10 percent of the class is over, 75 percent if no more than 20 percent of the class is over, and 50 percent if no more than 40 percent of the class is over. Refund deadlines vary according to the length and dates of the class; see page 7 for main session refund dates. A complete schedule of refund dates for all sessions is available at the Academic Records Office.

When a student withdraws during the quarter, no refund will be made until 30 days after the close of the month in which the student withdrew. Students who leave school without completing withdrawal procedures will be charged until proper arrangements are made. Refunds, if applicable, will be based on the date these arrangements are completed, not the date course attendance ended.

Housing

Single students are expected to live in the dormitory unless an exception is approved by the Office of Student Life and Mission. Dormitory rates are as follows:

Foreman Hall (women)—\$110 per week double occupancy; \$135 per week single occupancy

Sittner Hall (men)—\$105 per week double occupancy; \$130 per week single occupancy

Hansen Hall (Portland campus)—\$128 per week

Cafeteria

Vegetarian meals are available at the main campus dining room in Kellogg Hall from 11:30-1:15 weekdays, or as announced. Students may purchase noon meals for a flat rate of \$7.50 per meal. All cafeteria purchases by enrolled students, dormitory residents, or summer campus workers may be charged on student accounts. Enrolled students may also charge meals and food items at The Express, a university-operated mini-mart.

Music Fees

Music lessons can be taken for credit or no credit. When lessons are taken for credit, in addition to the regular tuition charge there is a lesson fee of \$175 per quarter for nine half-hour lessons or \$350 per quarter for nine one-hour lessons. When lessons are not taken for credit, the lesson fee is \$300 per quarter for nine half-hour lessons or \$600 per quarter for nine one-hour lessons. Summer Advantage students who include music lessons in their 12-hour load are charged the lesson fee.

Insurance

All registered, tuition-paying graduate and undergraduate students attending the College Place, Montana, Portland, or Rosario campuses, and students in the summer work program, are covered by the Student Accident Insurance policy.

If a student has been enrolled in the mandatory student sickness and additional accident insurance during the regular 2012-13 school year, that coverage is in effect through September 1, 2013. All new undergraduate students will be enrolled in this coverage for the summer at a cost of \$482 unless they submit an online waiver form verifying comparable coverage to Campus Health and Wellness at registration time.

On-campus Student Employment

Although Walla Walla University strives to meet each student's needs, work opportunities are limited during the summer months. Students are strongly urged to make arrangements for work before arriving on campus because employment is not guaranteed. Employment opportunities may be available in grounds, custodial, dorm housekeeping, plant maintenance, The Express, library, campus offices, and academic departments. Permission to begin working is given only to students who are registered for summer quarter or who have been accepted and preregistered for a minimum of 12 credit hours fall quarter.

Regulations require that all employees hired present **original** documents that establish both their identity and eligibility to work. All students wishing to work on the Walla Walla University campus are required to present documents **before** they will be authorized to begin work. Walla Walla University offers a Summer Bonus for students who are employed by Walla Walla University. Students who work a minimum of 460 hours during the summer of 2013 **and** who are registered for at least 12 credits of coursework at the end of the tenth day of fall quarter 2013 will receive a refund of 40 percent of all dormitory room rent charged for the summer, excluding single room charges, **or** a refund of 40 percent of university housing rent charged for the summer, not to exceed the cost of living in the dormitory.

All students who reside and work on campus during the summer are required to sign either a Summer Worker Agreement or a Summer Bonus Agreement by July 1, 2013, authorizing 60 percent of their earnings to be transferred directly to their student account to cover summer dormitory or university housing rent, cafeteria, tuition, and other charges as they occur. If charges exceed 60 percent of their earnings, students are responsible for paying their account promptly when billed.

Financial Aid

Students who need assistance for summer quarter may apply for financial aid. Some Walla Walla University grant dollars may be available; some students may also be eligible for a Federal Pell Grant. Loans may be available, such as Federal Stafford loans and institutional loans through Walla Walla University.

Students who wish to be considered for federal grants and loans will want to submit their 2012-13 FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) online at fafsa.ed.gov by **April 15, 2013**. The FAFSA must be received by the federal processor by June 30, 2013. **The federal government will not grant exceptions to this deadline.** A student cannot be considered for the Federal Pell Grant, SEOG grant, Perkins Loan, Nursing Loan, or Stafford Loan if this deadline is missed.

A completed Financial Aid file contains:

1. Correct SAR (Student Aid Report). The SAR is generated by the federal processor after a FAFSA is submitted. Students who list Walla Walla University (code 003799) on their FAFSA will have their SAR electronically sent to Walla Walla University by the federal processor. Students who did not list Walla Walla University on their FAFSA will need to contact Student Financial Services.
2. Walla Walla University Financial Aid Application (FAA). This application may be submitted online at sfs.wallawalla.edu/application.
3. Proof of high school completion (final transcript or letter of verification).
4. Additional documentation, if needed, for verification purposes.

Only financial aid that has been awarded by registration time may be deducted from the estimated costs. Students eligible for Federal or Washington State financial aid must be **registered for classes by June 30**. Students who register or add classes after that date cannot receive Federal or State financial aid for those classes.

Students who are on a waiting list or waiting for a letter of acceptance should complete the financial aid applications. Awarding of financial aid does not constitute acceptance into Walla Walla University. However, if a student moves off the waiting list at the last moment, it is to the student's advantage to have the financial aid application already completed.

Online Courses

Students taking online or hybrid courses must have basic computer competency, including use of e-mail and regular internet access. Information on minimum computer hardware requirements is available at the Equipment link on the distance learning website: wallawalla.edu/academics/distance-learning-d2l.

The regular tuition rate applies for all online and hybrid courses (see page 8). Summer Advantage students pay the Summer Advantage rate for online courses (see page 12). Online courses begin on June 24 and end on August 16 unless otherwise indicated. Enrollment minimums and maximums apply.

Online Registration

Students may register for online or hybrid courses as indicated below. For further information, see the "How to Register" link at wallawalla.edu/academics/distance-learning-d2l.

- Currently enrolled Walla Walla University students register online, beginning April 22, and must arrange financial clearance by June 24.
- Summer Advantage students register through the Academic Advisement Office, 800-558-2132 or <betty.duncan@wallawalla.edu> and must arrange financial clearance by June 24.
- North Pacific Union Conference K-12 teachers register online for all courses, including online or hybrid courses, at summer.wallawalla.edu/k-12.
- Guest students taking courses for transfer to other institutions (not seeking a degree at Walla Walla University) register by completing a registration form and credit card information online at wallawalla.edu/academics/distance-learning-d2l, or in person at the Academic Records Office.

Financial clearance is required for all students. Students who register for classes but do not obtain financial clearance by June 24 will be automatically dropped from all summer courses (see pages 6 and 8).

Summer Advantage Program

Summer Advantage is open to any undergraduate student who has not taken any classes at Walla Walla University since completion of high school or academy. A Summer Advantage student may take courses online and/or on the College Place campus, except certain courses that consist of individual instruction. A student in this program receives a discounted summer tuition rate. Here's what a Summer Advantage student saves:

- Dormitory rent: Summer Advantage students taking courses on the College Place campus must live in the dormitory if their permanent address is outside the Walla Walla Valley (\$105-110 per week)
- Meals: weekday noon meals are available at the cafeteria; students may also charge meals or food items at The Express mini-mart (see page 8) (approximately \$65-\$90 per week)
- Textbooks (approximately \$325-\$375)
- Health insurance; waived if proof of other coverage is provided to Campus Health & Wellness (\$482)
- Miscellaneous expenses (A few courses have additional fees; see page 8.)

All tuition, fees, and housing costs are due at registration (see page 8). Other charges are due when billed. Visa, MasterCard, and Discover are accepted. Online financial clearance is required by **June 24** (see page 6); financial clearance may be arranged after June 5 through a student's myWWU account or through Student Financial Services, (509) 527-2815 or (800) 656-2815 or <stufin@wallawalla.edu>.

Some job opportunities are available on campus for students who wish to work (see page 9). Advance arrangements are recommended, as job opportunities are limited. For a summer student taking a full academic load, a reasonable work load is 8-10 hours per week.

Application Process

Students interested in the Summer Advantage program should follow the usual application procedure for admission to Walla Walla University and indicate their interest in the Summer Advantage program on the application. (See page 6 for admission information.) After being accepted to the university, a student may reserve a place in the Summer Advantage program with a \$50 deposit at summer.wallawalla.edu/advantage. The reservation and deposit should be submitted by June 7, as enrollment is limited. In the event of cancellation by June 7, the deposit is refundable. The Summer Session Office will notify the student regarding acceptance into the program.

Summer Advantage Checklist

In summary, a Summer Advantage student must:

- ✓ Have taken no credits at Walla Walla University since completion of high school or academy
- ✓ Meet the Walla Walla University admission requirements and be admitted to the university as a regular online or College Place student
- ✓ Reserve a place in Summer Advantage with a \$50 deposit by June 7
- ✓ Pay the tuition, class fees (if any), and housing costs at registration, plus other charges when billed
- ✓ Complete online financial clearance through myWWU by June 24
- ✓ Live in the dormitory while taking courses on the College Place campus, if the student's permanent address is outside the Walla Walla Valley

Bible Lands Study Tour

Course dates are June 23–August 16, beginning with advance assignments before the tour begins and allowing for completion of coursework afterward. Students will explore the spiritual roots of the Christian faith as they travel to Turkey, Greece, Jordan, and Israel. The tour begins in Turkey, following the missionary travels of the apostles Paul and John in ancient sites such as Ephesus, Laodicea, and Colossae, and continues in Patmos, Athens, and Corinth in Greece. The tour concludes in Jordan and Israel, focusing on the life of Jesus as well as the messages of the Old Testament prophets while visiting Petra, the Dead Sea, Galilee, and Jerusalem. Application Process

Students planning to enroll at Rosario Beach Marine Laboratory must apply online at rosario.wallawalla.edu. A \$40 non-refundable fee is required at the time of application. Limited facilities at Rosario necessitate restricted enrollments in most classes; consequently, application does not guarantee acceptance. Early submission of application form and fee will increase the probability of acceptance.

Tuition and Lab Fees

Undergraduate tuition for the summer quarter is \$636 per quarter hour; graduate tuition is \$550 per quarter hour. Students registered for General Biology are charged for 12 quarter hours plus a lab fee of \$120. Undergraduate students registered for one or two upper-division (400+) or graduate (500+) courses are charged for 10 quarter hours plus a lab fee of \$400. Affiliate students pay tuition and lab fees directly to the school in which they are enrolled. The Summer Advantage program is not applicable to courses at Rosario.

Meals and Housing

All residents of single-student accommodations are charged a flat rate of \$875 for meals for the summer session. Housing charges are as follows:

All Rosario students must provide proof of health insurance coverage. Registered, tuition-paying Walla Walla University students are covered by a Student Accident Insurance policy.



Course Descriptions

(The following course descriptions are for courses offered in the summer of 2013 but not listed in the 2012-13 University Bulletin or Graduate Bulletin.)

Biology

BIOL 400 TOPICS: MARINE ECOTOXICOLOGY 5

Investigation of marine organismal responses to chemical stressors such as xenobiotics and pharmaceuticals. This laboratory-based course will emphasize techniques of isolating and manipulating DNA and RNA. Includes isolation of differentially expressed mRNA transcripts associated with chemical exposure; development of molecular probes from products of differential gene expression; analyzing these molecular probes to provide insight into impacted biochemical pathways; and identification of potential biomarkers of effect and/or exposure. Prerequisite: BIOL 141, 142, 143.

BIOL 400 TOPICS: MARINE MAMMALOGY 5

An introduction to the biology of marine mammals, covering diversity, morphology, behavior, ecology, and conservation. Particular attention will be given to current topics in management and conservation of marine mammals and to the marine mammals in the inland waters of Washington State and British Columbia (Salish Sea). This course involves labs, field observations, and a student-led research project. Prerequisite: BIOL 141, 142, 143.

Communications and Languages

DRMA 400 TOPICS: READERS' THEATER IN THE CLASSROOM 2

Guidance in selection of materials, preparation of script, and presentation techniques for readers' theater, with special emphasis on performance as a learning tool in the elementary or secondary curriculum. Includes reading from printed page with fluency and effectiveness, performance of literature in the classroom, applications across the curriculum, and staging elements useful in school productions. Prerequisite: SPCH 101 or permission of the instructor.

English

ENGL 474 STUDY TOUR: MARK'S JESUS— 4 INTERDISCIPLINARY APPROACHES TO THE BOOK OF MARK

An interdisciplinary approach to the gospel of Mark, designed for an on-site study of the geographical regions and archaeological sites connected with the biblical text and its ancient Roman contexts. The course is designed to model various scholarly methods in the study of a biblical text, including historical, literary, theological, and archaeological approaches. Prerequisite: at least sophomore standing. Offered as part of the Judges and Jesus Tour.

ENGL 474 STUDY TOUR: THE UNLIKELY HEROES OF JUDGES— 4 INTERDISCIPLINARY APPROACHES TO THE BOOK OF JUDGES

An interdisciplinary approach to the book of Judges, designed for an on-site study of the geographical regions and archaeological sites connected with the biblical text and its ancient Near Eastern contexts. The course is designed to model various scholarly methods in the study of a biblical text, including historical, literary, theological, archaeological, and anthropological approaches. Prerequisite: at least sophomore standing. Offered as part of the Judges and Jesus Tour.

Mathematics

MEDU 474 WORKSHOP: USING WEBWORK IN HIGH SCHOOL MATHEMATICS CLASSES 1

An introduction to WeBWorK, a well-tested free and open-source homework system for delivering individualized problems over the Web while providing instantaneous feedback to students. During the morning sessions all aspects of using the WeBWorK system will be covered, including administering a course, using the accompanying Open Problem Library, and an introduction to editing and writing WeBWorK problems. In afternoon sessions participants will collaborate to create a complete array of WeBWorK assignments for use in their mathematics classes.

Technology

AVIA 400 TOPICS: MISSION/HUMANITARIAN FLIGHT TRAINING 2

Developing pilot skills related to mission/humanitarian flight operations. Training will include an introduction to low level flight operations and flying in mountainous terrain. Specialized training in advanced takeoffs and landings to include blind approaches and departures and takeoffs and landings on curved, sloped, and primitive surfaces. Prerequisite: AVIA 336 or permission of the instructor.

Theology

RELB 474 STUDY TOUR: THE HOLY LAND AND ITS PEOPLES 4

A study of the cultural, historical, geographical, and theological dimensions of the Old and New Testament Scriptures through travel to the Middle East. Primary attention will be given to the teachings of the Old and New Testaments and the significance these Scriptures continue to have within Judaism, Christianity, and Islam. Offered as part of the Bible Lands Study Tour.

RELB 474 STUDY TOUR: PAUL AND THE GENTILE MISSION 2

Study tour retracing the spread of the gospel across ancient Asia Minor. Special emphasis will be given to the earliest days of the Christian mission as it spread from Antioch to Galatia and Ephesus. Enrollment limited to participants in the Upper Columbia Conference study tour.

Special, free, drop-in tutorial help is available in the Teaching Learning Center for all students who wish to improve their basic skills or increase their understanding of content in lower-division classes. Trained upper-division students tutor individuals or small groups. Established tutorial services are available in mathematics, sciences, and writing. The Writing Center is open to all students, including graduate students, who wish to learn how to improve or polish their papers.
