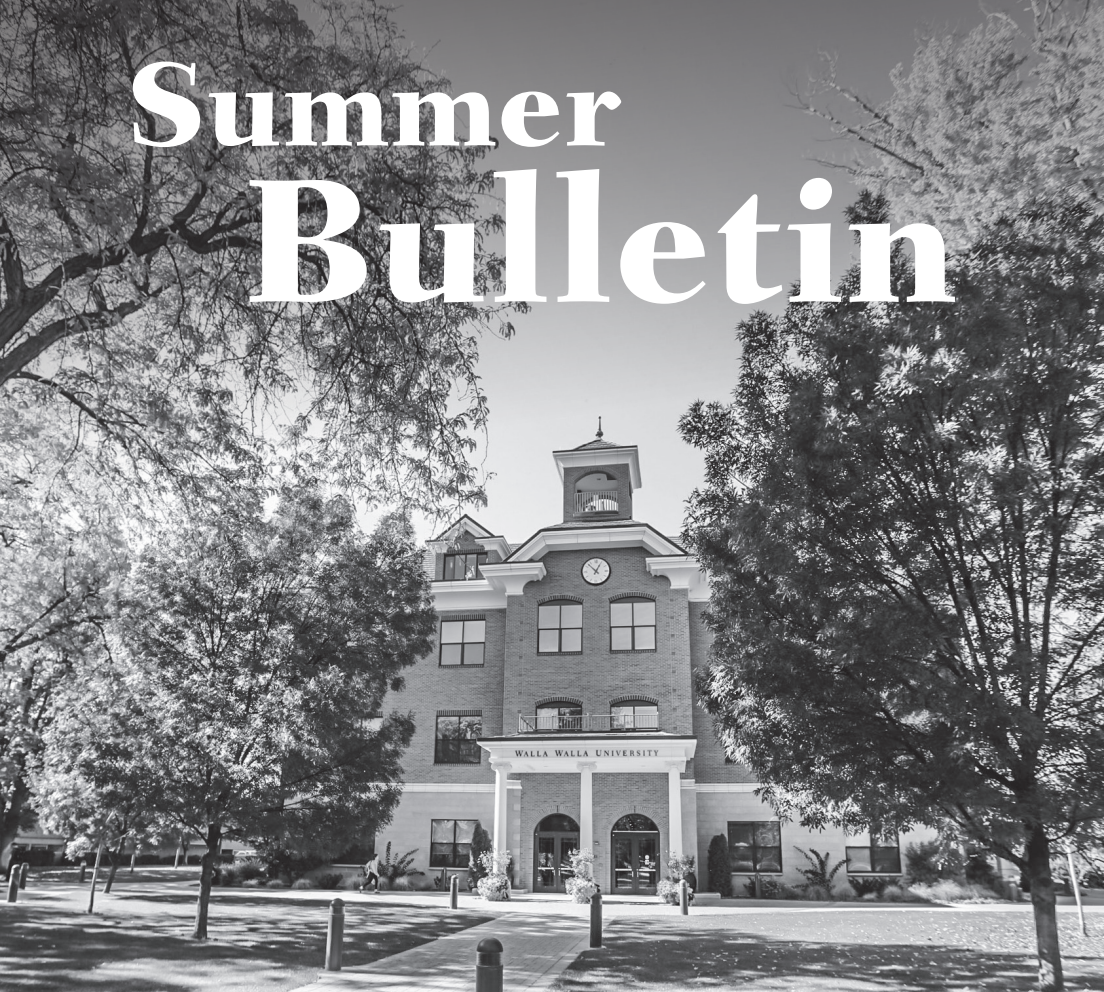

Academic Information

Admission

Individuals seeking admission to Walla Walla University must apply for admission either online at wallawalla.edu/apply or on forms supplied by the Marketing and Enrollment Services office. Prospective undergraduate students must meet admission requirements as outlined in the Undergraduate Bulletin. Prospective graduate students must meet admission requirements as outlined in the Graduate Bulletin. A “Steps to Enrollment Checklist” for undergraduate and graduate students can be found at apply.wallawalla.edu/info.

North Pacific Union Conference K-12 teachers who are not seeking to obtain a degree do not need to apply for admission.

Individuals who are not seeking a degree may apply at the Academic Records Office to take courses for which they have sufficient background. As non-matriculating students, they are not eligible for a degree, although by completing requirements for regular admission they may become degree candidates.

Registration

Continuing or returning students may register for classes online through myWWU beginning April 15. New students, including Summer Advantage participants, will be given an opportunity to register at academy campuses or by phone (800) 558-2132 after about April 18. Distance learning students may register according to the instructions at wallawalla.edu/academics/distance-learning (see page 10).

North Pacific Union Conference K-12 teachers who qualify for conference sponsorship may register online at wallawalla.edu/k12 after about April 19. Conference authorization will be verified before the registration is processed. Early registration is encouraged.

Any students, including K-12 teachers, who have not completed registration in advance, may register at the Academic Records Office during regular office hours on the first day of classes if the course is still open or has not been cancelled. Registration is not official until all procedures have been completed and financial clearance has been arranged.

Financial Clearance

Online financial clearance is required and may be arranged through a student’s myWWU account or through Student Financial Services June 5 (see page 7). **Students who register for classes but do not obtain financial clearance by 4 p.m. on June 24 will be automatically dropped from their courses.**

Rosario Beach Marine Laboratory Registration

Students planning to enroll at the Rosario Beach Marine Laboratory must apply online at rosario.wallawalla.edu. Registration for classes will be finalized at Rosario on Monday, June 24. Financial and housing arrangements must be made prior to arrival (see page 13).

Veterans Registration

Students receiving Veterans educational benefits need to register for a full summer course load. Questions regarding enrollment for summer school should be directed to the veteran's advisor in the Academic Records Office at (509) 527-2811.

Late Registration

Students who register after a class or workshop has begun will be charged a late registration fee of \$75. Students may not register for eight-week classes after the first week of the summer term. Students taking short-term courses must be registered and in attendance the first day of classes.

Course Load

The maximum course load for which an undergraduate student may enroll is 12 credits distributed evenly throughout the eight-week session, unless the associate vice president for Academic Administration approves an overload. A course load of 9-12 credits is considered a full load for undergraduate students for the eight-week session. Course loads for graduate students vary according to the program of study.

Withdrawals

Students withdrawing from any or all courses must submit the appropriate official withdrawal form to the Academic Records Office before the class is 75 percent over. During Summer Session, withdrawal deadlines vary according to the starting date and duration of each class; the table below lists main session withdrawal deadlines, as well as tuition refund deadlines. A complete schedule of withdrawal deadlines for all sessions is available at the Academic Records Office.

When a student withdraws during the quarter, no refund will be made until 30 days after the close of the month in which the student withdrew. Students who leave school without completing withdrawal procedures will be charged until proper arrangements are made. Refunds, if applicable, will be based on the date these arrangements are completed, not the date course attendance ended.

Financial Information

Tuition

Undergraduate tuition for the summer quarter is \$755 per quarter hour; graduate tuition is \$615 per quarter hour. Students accepted into the summer Portland campus nursing program are eligible for bracket tuition of \$9040. For additional financial information, please contact the School of Nursing. All students should plan to pay their tuition at the time of registration. Students who register for classes but do not obtain financial clearance by 4 p.m. on June 24, the first day of summer session, will be automatically dropped from their courses.

Fees

Class fees are charged as published in the 2018-19 Walla Walla University Financial Bulletin at wallawalla.edu/academics/bulletins. Workshops, Study Tours (see page 13), Rosario Beach Marine Laboratory (see page 13) or extended field trips may require payment of special fees.

In addition to any class fees, the following General Fee applies.

**This fee only applies to students who are at least half time (6 credits for undergraduate, 4 credits for graduate) during the summer session. It does not apply to NPUC Teachers, study tour, ACA or Rosario students.*

Tuition – North Pacific Union Conference Teachers

Teachers from within the North Pacific Union Conference of Seventh-day Adventists whose employing conferences confirm that they are under a full-time contract for the 2019-20 school year may qualify for a tuition waiver. However, teachers must pay directly when billed for books, supplies, graduation fees, miscellaneous class fees, or room rental charges. Conference sponsorship does not cover classes requiring individualized instruction (aviation, music lessons, etc.).

Tuition Refunds

A student withdrawing from classes during the summer quarter will receive a refund in accordance with the policy stated in the online Financial Bulletin. A 100 percent refund is given if no more than 10 percent of the class is over, 75 percent, if no more than 20 percent of the class is over, and 50 percent, if no more than 40 percent of the class is over. Refund deadlines vary according to the length and dates of each class; see page 6 for main session refund dates. A complete schedule of refund dates is available at the Academic Records Office.

When a student withdraws during the quarter, no refund will be made until 30 days after the close of the month in which the student withdrew. Students who leave school without completing withdrawal procedures will be charged until proper arrangements are made. Refunds, if applicable and approved, will be based on the date withdrawal arrangements are completed, not the date course attendance ended.

Housing

Single students under 22 years of age and students without 135 credits hours are required to live in the residence halls during the Summer Session, unless an exception is approved by the office of Residential Life and Housing at housing@wallawalla.edu or (509) 527-2539. For information see www.wallawalla.edu/housing. Submit a housing application at housing.wallawalla.edu.

Residence hall rooms may be available between quarters (i.e. Spring to Summer, Summer to Fall). Contact the residence halls directly for information at housing@wallawalla.edu.

Cafeteria

Vegetarian meals are available at the Kellogg Dining Hall from 11:30 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. weekdays, or as announced. All cafeteria purchases by enrolled students or summer campus workers may be charged on student accounts.

Enrolled students may also charge meals and food items, up to \$80 per month, at The Express, a university-operated mini-mart.

Music Fees

Music lessons can be taken for credit or no credit. When lessons are taken for credit, in addition to the regular tuition charge, there is a lesson fee of \$225 per quarter for nine half-hour lessons or \$450 per quarter for nine one-hour lessons. When lessons are not taken for credit (no-tuition charge), the lesson fee is \$335 per quarter for nine half-hour lessons or \$670 per quarter for nine one-hour lessons.

Insurance

All Walla Walla University students must have health insurance while they are enrolled at WWU. Students are responsible for obtaining and maintaining their health insurance. If a student's health insurance lapses while they are a student at WWU, they are responsible for obtaining replacement coverage. All students, and in particular our international students, are encouraged to carefully review their health insurance coverage to ensure that they are covered for services in the Walla Walla region. If students require assistance in finding a health insurance plan to meet their needs, please go to www.wallawalla.edu/insurance or contact the University Health Clinic at (509) 527-2425.

On-Campus Student Employment

Work opportunities are limited during the summer months and employment is not guaranteed. Students are strongly encouraged to arrange for work prior to arriving on campus. Employment

opportunities may be available in grounds, custodial, residence hall custodial, plant maintenance, The Express, library, campus offices, and academic departments. Permission to begin working is given only to students who are registered for summer quarter or who have been accepted and preregistered for a minimum of 12 credit hours fall quarter.

All students wishing to work on the Walla Walla University campus are required to present original documents that establish both their identity and eligibility to work before they will be authorized to begin work. For more information, contact the Student Employment Office at (509) 527-2357 or (800) 656-2357.

All students who work on campus during the summer are required to sign a Summer Worker Agreement at the Student Employment Office by June 24, 2019. Student employees who rent from the university, either residence hall or university housing, must pay any previous balance owing on their accounts and make arrangements for payment of summer rent by June 24. They may either pay their summer rent in advance or agree to a payroll deduction of at least 75 percent of their wages to cover their rent, cafeteria, and other charges as they occur, and to save for fall quarter expenses. If charges exceed the payroll deduction, students are responsible for paying their account promptly when billed. Students with unusual situations may consult a financial counselor about a possible reduction in their payroll deduction.

Student summer employees who do not rent housing from the university are encouraged to voluntarily sign up for a payroll deduction of at least 35 percent to save for fall quarter expenses.

Financial Aid

Students who need assistance for summer quarter may apply for limited financial aid. Some students may be eligible for a Federal Pell Grant or loans, such as Federal Direct Loans.

Students who wish to be considered for federal grants and loans will want to submit their 2018-19 FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) online at <https://fafsa.ed.gov/> prior to June 30, 2019. The federal government will not grant exceptions to this deadline. A student cannot be considered for the Federal Pell Grant or the Federal Direct Loan if this deadline is missed. All financial forms and applications can be found at wallawalla.edu/forms.

A completed Financial Aid file contains:

1. Correct ISIR (Institutional Student Information Record). The federal processor generates the ISIR after a FAFSA is submitted. Students who list Walla Walla University (code 003799) on their FAFSA will have their ISIR electronically sent to Walla Walla University by the federal processor. Students who did not list Walla Walla University on their FAFSA will need to add WWU's code (003799) to their FAFSA.
2. Walla Walla University Financial Aid Application (either the undergraduate or the graduate depending on acceptance into a program). Students who have been accepted to WWU will need to sign in to complete the form at sfs.wallawalla.edu/aid-application.

3. *Proof of school completion* (final transcript or letter of verification) for undergraduate; proof of Bachelor completion (final transcript) for graduate.
4. Additional documentation, if needed, for verification purposes.

Only financial aid that has been awarded by registration time may be deducted from the estimated costs. Students eligible for federal financial aid must be registered for classes by June 30. Students who register or add classes after that date cannot receive federal financial aid for those classes.

Students who are on a waiting list or waiting for a letter of acceptance should complete the financial aid application. Aid is not awarded until students receive their acceptance to Walla Walla University. However, if a student is accepted and moves off the waiting list at the last moment, it is to the student's advantage to have the financial aid application already completed.

Online and Hybrid Courses

Students taking online or hybrid courses must have basic computer competency, including use of e-mail and regular high-speed internet access. Information on minimum computer hardware requirements is available at the Equipment link on the distance learning website: wallawalla.edu/academics/distance-learning.

The regular tuition rate applies for all online and hybrid courses (see page 7). Summer Advantage students pay the Summer Advantage rate for online courses (see page 12). Online courses begin on June 24 and end on August 16 unless otherwise indicated. Course enrollment minimums and maximums apply.

Registration

Students may register for online or hybrid courses as indicated below. For further information, see the "How to Register" link at <https://www.wallawalla.edu/academics/distance-learning/how-to-register/>.

- Currently enrolled Walla Walla University students register online through myWWU beginning April 16 and must arrange financial clearance by 4 p.m. on June 24.
- Summer Advantage students register through the Academic Advisement Office at (800) 558-2132 or advisement@wallawalla.edu and must arrange financial clearance by 4 p.m. on June 24.
- North Pacific Union Conference K-12 teachers register online for all courses, including online or hybrid courses, at wallawalla.edu/k12.
- Guest students taking courses for transfer to other institutions (not seeking a degree at Walla Walla University) register by completing a registration form and payment information online at wallawalla.edu/academics/distance-learning, or in person at the Academic Records Office.

Financial clearance is required for all students. Students who register for classes but do not obtain financial clearance by 4 p.m. on June 24 will be automatically dropped from all summer courses (see page 5).

General Class Information

General studies courses are offered at WWU in person, online and hybrid. Dates are June 24–August 16 unless otherwise indicated. Students should consult the Academic Advisement office or their academic advisor in determining which courses will meet their general studies requirements. Course Descriptions

Description of courses offered in the summer of 2019 can be viewed at wallawalla.edu/academics/bulletins in the 2018-19 Undergraduate Bulletin or Graduate Bulletin.

The following courses are offered this summer but not published in 2018-19 Bulletin.

BIOL 460 – MARINE ECOLOGY (5 CR)

Study of interspecific, intraspecific, and community relationships demonstrated by marine organisms.

BIOL 400A – BACTERIAL PATHOGENESIS IN HUMANS (5 CR)

A study of human bacterial pathogens and the mechanisms involved in disease development. Attention is given to how bacterial pathogens influence humanity with topics ranging from host cell molecular interactions to epidemiological perspectives on disease.

BIOL 400B – BIOLOGICAL OCEANOGRAPHY (5 CR)

Biological oceanography is the study of marine organisms, their quantitative distribution in time and space and their interactions with each other and their ocean environment. This course examines how oceanic environments control the form and function of marine life. Topics include: distributions of planktonic production and abundance, marine habitats, coastal zones, upwelling centers, gyres, the deep sea, nutrient cycling and human impacts on ocean biology.

Summer Advantage Program

Summer Advantage is open to any undergraduate student who has not taken any Walla Walla University credits, including Adventist Colleges Abroad credits, since completion of high school or academy. A Summer Advantage student may take up to 12 credits **online and/or on the College Place campus**, except certain courses that consist of individual instruction (i.e., music lessons, aviation, etc.). A student in this program receives a discounted summer tuition rate.

Additional Costs

- **Residence hall rent:** Summer Advantage students taking courses on the College Place campus must live in the residence hall unless an exception is approved by the office of Residential Life and Housing (\$143 per week)
- **Meals:** vegetarian meals are available in the Kellogg Hall Cafeteria from 11:30-1:00 p.m. on weekdays. All cafeteria purchases by enrolled students, residence hall residents, or summer campus workers, may be charged on students accounts. Students may also charge food items at The Express mini-mart (see page 8) (a la cart approximately \$70-\$85 per week)
- Textbooks (approximately \$325–\$375)
- Course fees if applicable (music lessons, aviation, etc.; see online class schedule)
- Miscellaneous expenses

All tuition, fees, and housing costs are due at registration (see page 5). Other charges are due when billed. Visa, MasterCard, American Express, and Discover credit cards are accepted, but are charged a 1.75% convenience fee. ***No fee applies to debit cards, electronic-checks, cash or paper checks.***

Online financial clearance is required by 4 p.m. on June 24 (see page 5). Financial clearance may be arranged after June 5 through a student's myWWU account or through Student Financial Services at (509) 527-2815 or (800) 656-2815 or stufin@wallawalla.edu.

Job opportunities may be available on campus for students who wish to work (see page 8). Advance arrangements are recommended, as job opportunities are limited. For a summer student taking a full academic load, a reasonable workload is 8–10 hours per week.

Application Process

Students interested in the Summer Advantage program should follow the usual application procedure for admission to Walla Walla University at apply.wallawalla.edu/info.

Summer Advantage Checklist

In summary, a Summer Advantage student must:

- Meet the Walla Walla University admission requirements and be admitted to the university as a regular online or College Place student.
- Pay the required \$200 enrollment fee.
- Not have taken any Walla Walla University credits since completion of high school or academy.

- Pay tuition, fees and housing costs at registration, plus other charges when billed.
- Complete online financial clearance through myWWU by 4 p.m. on June 24.

Application Process

Students planning to enroll at the Rosario Beach Marine Laboratory must apply online at rosario.wallawalla.edu. A \$60 non-refundable fee is required at the time of application. Limited facilities at Rosario necessitate restricted enrollments in most classes; consequently, application does not guarantee acceptance. Early submission of the application and fee may impact of acceptance.

Tuition and Lab Fees

Undergraduate tuition for the summer quarter is \$755 per quarter hour; graduate tuition is \$615 per quarter hour. Students registered for General Biology are charged for 12 quarter hours plus a lab fee of \$225. Undergraduate students registered for one or two upper-division (400+) or graduate (500+) courses are charged for 10 quarter hours plus a lab fee of \$400. Affiliate students pay tuition and lab fees directly to the school in which they are enrolled. The Summer Advantage program is not applicable to courses at Rosario.

Meals and Housing

All residents of single-student accommodations are charged a flat rate of \$1,070 for meals for the summer session. Housing charges are as follows:

Insurance

All students are responsible for obtaining and maintaining personal health insurance while enrolled in courses or conducting research at Rosario.
